■ THE SHARK WHISPERER To study great whites for a recent documentary, Cousteau built a \$100,000, 14-ft. submarine shaped like a shark, "The idea was to get close to them by pretending to be one of them," he says. "The shark-sub was completely noiseless and rolled its eyes and puffed its gills. A lot of people thought it was superkooky-they looked at me like I was pitching 2001: A Space Odyssev."

ALL CREATURES GREAT AND SMALL

"I could never choose a favorite animal, there are so many cool ones," says Cousteau. "Obviously I like sharks. I love octopus, and mantis shrimp are fascinating." Back on land the single adventurer admits there's one animal that puzzles him: his shepherd mix Heidi. "She's scared of phone booths," Cousteau says. Alas, she's no better at sea. "When I go underwater, she paces and barks, so she can't come on boats."
